

Christ comes to set us free

“Rather, in every nation whoever fears him and acts uprightly is acceptable to him” (Acts 10:35). We get this great line of Peter’s speech in our second reading. The context of this is that Peter proclaims that salvation is offered to all people, and not just the Jewish people. I want to focus on that phrase, “whoever acts uprightly is acceptable to him.”

What does it mean to act uprightly. This has a different meaning in our popular culture now than it did at the time when it was written. Our popular culture has sought to change the definition of what a human person is. Therefore, the definition of living uprightly is changed to mean that I am a good person. If you boil it down, it means “I haven’t committed the worst of all crimes, thereby I am a good person.” However, that is not what acting uprightly means in this passage. Acting uprightly in this passage means living in accord with all of God’s commandments and laws.

We believe that we are made in God’s image and likeness or in philosophical terms, we have a human nature. Put very simply, we were made in a certain way and when we act in accord with that way, it is good for us. When we act against the way that we were made, it causes harm to us. Acting contrary to our nature we also call sin. Sins are not just God’s list of “do nots,” but things that harm us and others. An example of using a thing contrary to its nature is like using a battery powered drill to pound spikes into railroad ties, you can do it, but it causes damage to it.

Sin harms us and imprisons us. An example of this might be telling a lie. When we tell a lie, then we must tell another one to protect the first lie. The more lies that we tell, the harder it is to protect that original lie, and the more anxiety that we feel that we will be discovered. We become caught in a web of lies that become increasingly more tangled the longer it goes on. We become trapped by that web. It harms our reputation because people will not believe us. It also hurts others because they must act upon false information. It likewise offends God because it rejects him, and it abuses His gifts.

Why does it matter what the culture believes? Culture is like the air that we breathe. We cannot see it, and it is all around us. We influence it, and it in turn influences us if we are not attentive to it. In short, we can begin to believe things that do not align with our Catholic faith like, “I get to decide what is good or bad for me.”

Jesus Christ came to set us free from sin, not just its effects. Translation, he came to give us the grace so that we will not commit sin, and not just that I would not be eternally separated from him (i.e. hell). In short, acting uprightly does not mean “being a good person,” it means that I act in accordance with the way that I was created. The million-dollar question and answer of how do I live uprightly is keep coming to the sacraments. It is through the sacraments that Jesus transforms our hearts by his grace. He heals us when we hurt ourselves and others through sin. He also gives us his grace so that we can live in intimate communion with him. When we are in that communion, then we are not as tempted by the cheap imitation that is sin. “Eye has not seen, and ear has not heard, and what has not entered the human heart, what God has prepared for those who love him.”
