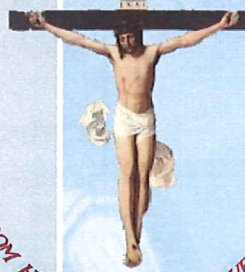

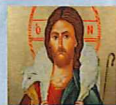

A Sacramental view of the World

I wrote a little while back that being Catholic is about learning a whole new way of seeing the world. It is not merely following a set of rules or fulfilling numerous obligations. Seeing the world with a Catholic lens helps us to look at the world with a sacramental worldview.

We all learned that a sacrament is defined as a visible sign, instituted by Jesus Christ, by which invisible grace and inward sanctification are communicated to the soul. Put simply, the visible sign brings about the spiritual reality that it signifies. For example, when I pour water over the head of someone who is unbaptized, and I say the words of baptism, then that person's soul is washed clean of all sin (original and personal). When I pour the water and say the words, then this spiritual effect takes place. A sacrament points to the two worlds (physical and spiritual), and it also points that each world affects the other.

We humans are God's created hybrids. We have a rational soul which is like God and the angels, but we also have a physical body like the other animals here in this world. Those two things (body and a rational soul) are essential to humans, and even at the end of time, we will be body and soul. We do not become angels. Another way of saying this is that we have one foot in the physical world, and the other in the spiritual world. This does not ignore the physical world in front of our eyes. Rather, it shows us that what we do in this physical world has lasting effects in the spiritual world that is ever present around us.

This is the opposite of what our culture teaches. Our culture teaches that either we are just animals (merely physical without an immortal soul), or we are physical beings with an immortal soul, but our actions in this world do not affect our immortal soul. Both views are incorrect. We are body and soul and what we do with our body affects our soul. This is the foundation for a Catholic worldview.

Another foundational piece of the Catholic worldview is that this life is a testing ground for the eternal life to come. The short time that we are given here is to form our decision for what we will choose in eternity. The choice when it is boiled down to its simplest form is either "thy will be done" or "my will be done". Will we choose to love and serve God with our every thought, word, and action or will we choose to serve ourselves?

Having a sacramental worldview is to keep in mind that there is far more taking place around us than just what we can see. We live and move in this physical world that we see, but we are a part of an invisible world that extends far beyond what we see. This happens not only at mass, but at every part of our life. We live in two worlds, but we can only see one. That is a part of our hardship, that we can only see the one world with our physical eyes. Having a sacramental worldview is to keep in mind that both worlds exist and that the spiritual world is more real, lasting, and beautiful than the physical one. If we have a sacramental worldview, we see everything differently because we remember that we live in both worlds.
