

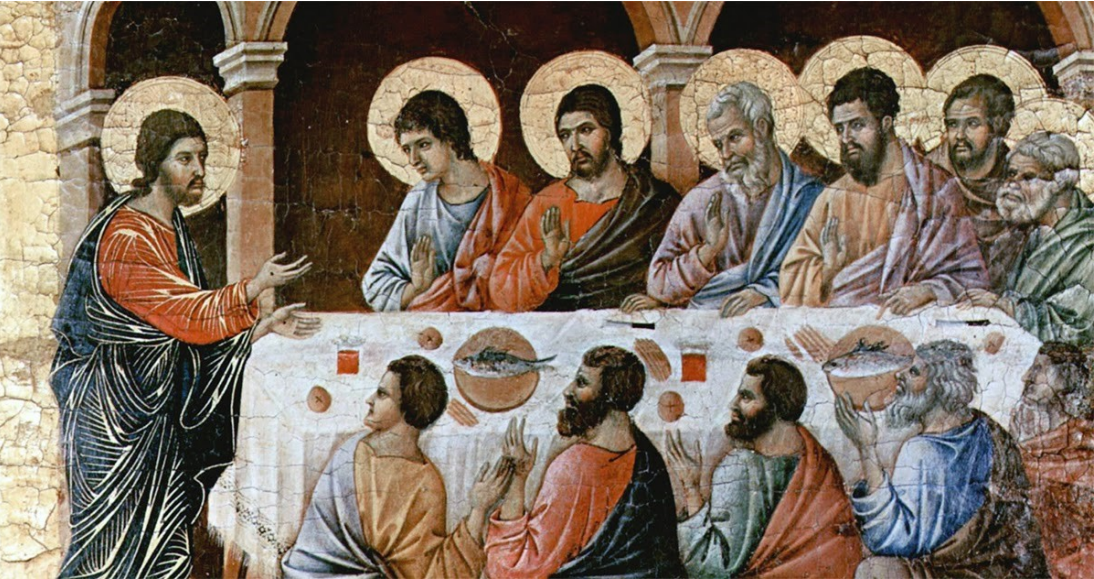


# THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER

These weeks of Easter bring the Church to the stories of the risen Christ appearing to his disciples. The fact that they were all amazed tells us that none of them were expecting Jesus to rise from the grave. When he did appear to them many did not recognize him at first, and he gives constant reassurance that he was the Christ who they knew. He was not a stranger or a ghost, but “it is I, myself.” Jesus lovingly shows his Church that he is risen in the spirit AND the body. There was no body in the tomb, Christ tells Mary Magdalene not to cling to his body, he let Thomas probe the wounds in his flesh, and as a final proof of his risen flesh, he ate.



Christ's bodily resurrection reveals several things about human redemption. First and foremost, Christ did not despise to take on our human flesh. He did not abandon his human nature in the tomb once his earthly life was complete. Instead, he mercifully bound himself to our human nature so completely that it would remain with him as he returns in glory to the Father. Human nature has now entered heaven in Christ. Secondly, if Christ willed to keep his body forever united to himself, we also must treat the body with the utmost dignity. Our body is not just a 'shell' that must be shed at the end of our life, but instead, a sacred vessel in which the life of God chooses to unite to himself on the last day. God is not content to let our bodies suffer decay forever. We too will rise in the flesh and behold God with our own eyes. Thirdly, whatever we do in the body can be a sign of our risen life for others. Our bodily activities achieve their highest honor when we give flesh and blood to the gospel.



The Church's belief in the bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ is nowhere more apparent than in the funeral rites. In death, we are given a grave so that our earthly remains may be kept together as the body awaits its resurrection. Until that day the body 'sleeps' in peace now that its earthly struggle is over. But it also awaits the awakening on the last day, when Christ will raise the dead and all will receive a new, glorified flesh, free from all the trappings of earthly life.
