FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



What is heresy and why does it matter? Heresy, as defined by the Catechism, is "the obstinate denial after Baptism of a truth which must be believed with divine and Catholic faith." The Catholic Church further applies this term to the baptized who are in "obstinate doubt." By this definition, when the Church combats heresy throughout history, she is battling false teachings that have entered the Catholic Church by way of her own members. Furthermore, to be considered a heretic, one hasn't simply acted out of ignorance, made a mistake in reasoning, or acted rashly, as we all do when we sin. No, the heretic is one who "obstinately" persists in their refusal to ascend in faith to the teaching of the Catholic Church. This means that the heretic knows full-well that their beliefs are in direct contradiction to the Church, they refuse any correction to their conscience by the Church, and they reject any appeal to repent of their error. For each of us baptized, an obstinate failure to believe in any teaching of the Catholic faith constitutes a grave sin, which must always be treated seriously because it places the soul in immediate jeopardy of eternal hell. Catholics believe that the authentic teachings of our Church come to us by way of God's revelation, or self-manifestation to the world. Catholic teaching, we believe, is the Truth of God, unveiled by God Himself to the Apostles and passed down to our present age. To deny or doubt any of these teachings is to deny God himself, which is the opposite of what a baptized person professes when they join the Church, "I BELIEVE..."



What is the heresy of Modernism and what are its consequences?

Many voices were raised in the past against what St. Pius X referred to as the pernicious errors of Modernism, which have been thoroughly absorbed into our society and even within the Church. In the words of the philosopher, Marcel de Corte, "a spiritual degradation more profound than anything the Church has experienced in history, a cancerous sickness in which the cells multiply fast in order to destroy what is still healthy in the Mystical Body. It is an attempt to transform the Kingdom of God into the Kingdom of Man, to substitute for the Church consecrated to the worship of God a Church dedicated to the cult of Humanity. This is the most dreadful, the most terrible of heresies.'

Modernism is firstly a philosophical error. The evil which afflicts the individual man... is subjectivism. The intellect renounces its power to know things as they are in themselves, independently of the knowing mind. It deprives itself of the trampoline of reality: why be surprised, then, that it owns itself incapable of rising to the Origin of reality? But by exiling itself from reality, the intellect automatically turns inward upon itself.

Man relates to others and to society (familial, political and religious) through culture and thinking and speaking. If modernism divorces truth from reality, how could there still be a single eternal and necessary truth in the domain of faith and of social life? The negation of reality and truth leads ultimately to man closing up like an oyster, proclaiming himself radically autonomous with: "you shall be like gods".

The worship of "Ego" in all levels, individual, moral and social, leads to the shipwreck of reason and faith.

This divorce establishes the bases for the accomplishment of the Satanic project: "eritis sicut Deus—you will be as God": Coming from subjectivism, the modernist heresy returns to subjectivism, dethroning God and placing man in His place. It substitutes a Church dedicated to the cult of Humanity for the Church consecrated to the worship of God.

In theology, to accept the revolution of modern thought means that one cannot understand Catholic doctrine. Often times we have even heard this revolution expressed in so-called Church hymns, like "Sing a New Church" or "Let Us Build A House", which express the modern sentiment that man is the builder, and not Christ.



The first Catholic church, St. Ann's, in the Keyapaha, SD area was finished in 1921. Roy Rohmn was the carpenter in charge. It is 1½ miles west and 2½ miles south of the town site of Keyapaha. On the morning of June 24, 1930, Marie Storms and James Welsh were married in the church. That afternoon St. Ann's was completely destroyed by a tornado. The parishioners decided to rebuild as soon as they could. This time W. H. Lawler was the carpenter. The church was rebuilt by October of that same year.
