

Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University
presented by Thomas & Jadviga Strubel

Hello,

We had our fifth FPU class this past Tuesday! We are over the halfway mark and changing our lives! We talked about how marketing is trying to mess up our debt free plans. It was an interesting lesson and I have placed a great explanation from Dave Ramsey himself below about what we learned. Next we will learn about how important insurance is to a healthy financial plan.
Last Week's Lesson:

Buyer Beware

Dave draws on decades of experience to reveal the power and influence that marketing has on your everyday buying decisions.

Here is a little preview of last week's lesson from DaveRamsey.com:

There's an old saying in real estate—*caveat emptor*, or "let the buyer beware." This came from the fact that the seller usually pays the real estate commission. Since the seller is paying the agents, the buyer technically has no representation—so he should "beware." But this is a phrase that goes far beyond real estate. Out in the real world of marketing and consumerism, "buyer beware" simply means that you better watch out for yourself and your family. **It's not someone else's job to make sure you aren't getting duped**—and it's certainly not the government's job, either. Americans see thousands of advertisements every day, and more than a million marketing messages each year. If we don't learn patience and restraint—and how to say no!—then we can get into some serious financial trouble. As consumers, **we need to think about what we're buying and how it's been sold to us.** We must quit being lazy in making purchase decisions—because millions of marketing dollars are spent in an effort to prey on this laziness. Truth is: The product is already priced higher to cover the expense of the financing. First, remember that you are not helpless. **Develop a power over purchase.** Second, carefully consider your buying motives when you are making purchasing decisions. Why do you want or think you need this item? Finally, **make slow purchase decisions.** If the item is a significant purchase, you should never buy without waiting overnight. Companies are spending billions of dollars and using hours and hours of work time to sell us their stuff. Some of their products are quality, some are not. No matter what you are buying, don't get caught up in a marketing trick, paying for something you don't need at a price you can't afford.

The Role of Insurance

In this lesson, Dave walks you through the world of insurance, carefully explaining what you need—and what you need to avoid.

Right Judgment

Often when we think of a judge, we think of severity or cold justice. Courtroom and criminal-justice dramas—even some news coverage of major crimes and scandals—love depicting the offender as receiving his or her just rewards, with the judge or prosecutor smugly reflecting or sighing in relief.

But in the scriptural sense, a judge is much more. A good judge is an educator, teacher, and parent. Good judges promote wise living and respect for authority and the law. Their tools are sometimes mercy, sometimes penance, but always prompted by love.

A better image to understand the judge's role is a parent educating his or her child. Sometimes education means letting something slide; sometimes it means holding the child accountable. Both can be expressions of love.

Today's readings caution us against selfish passions that prompt us to judge. One who has been forgiven much but is then harsh with others will be severely punished—or as Sirach puts it, God “remembers their sins in detail.”

Mercy toward others is key to the Gospel message. Some think they are good Christians because they don't steal and haven't killed anyone. They may even be active in their parish but are highly critical of others.

Remember, as Jesus said: “The measure with which you measure will be measured out to you” (Matthew

7:2). And, “So will my heavenly Father do to you, unless each of you forgives his brother from his heart.”



Dear Padre,

Pope Francis said, "Who am I to judge?" But aren't we supposed to hold each other to a higher standard of living and judge actions as moral or sinful?

Pope Francis is not the only one to warn about judging. He is likely drawing his guidance from Jesus in Matthew 7:1-2. Both the Lord and the pope warn us about judging others and looking down upon those we consider "more sinful." That sort of comparison can easily lead us to arrogance and hypocrisy.

The Lord teaches us there will be a final (or particular) judgment each of us will have to face. We will all have to stand before God and give an account of our actions. This teaches us that God is the only one qualified to fully know a person's heart and intentions. If we begin to act as a judge of people, then we are playing God.

However, your question also implies that among believers we are to hold one another accountable in our Christian community. This is correct (Matthew 18:15-17). In the body of Christ, there is a responsibility to help and encourage

each other to follow Jesus. Among the baptized, there should be the sharing of virtues and some accountability to the Church. We call one another higher, not through accusation, but through love and service. It is my duty to help fellow believers in their discipleship, as it is their duty to help me with mine. I find that I appreciate those who care enough about me to want to help me be a better Catholic, priest, or person. In community, we should build up in fellowship, not tear down in judgment.
