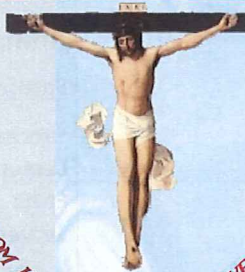

A Safe Environment for Children and Young People

The Catholic Diocese of Rapid City is firmly committed to creating and maintaining the safest possible environment for our children and young people. To report allegations of sexual abuse by church personnel, contact Victim Assistance Coordinator Irene Lee.

In accordance with diocesan policy, all allegations of sexual misconduct involving children or young people by priests, deacons, lay employees, or volunteers serving the Diocese of Rapid City will be investigated.

I have competed well; I have kept the faith!

I love the lines that St. Paul gives in our second reading this Sunday. "I have competed well; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith" (2 Tim 4:6-8). There is something invigorating to be able to say these words. It is to say that I have not held back, I left everything on the field, and I have fought the valiant fight. We cannot just step into the arena on one day and expect to win the fight. The athletes who compete train so that they can be a sharp instrument, ready to fight.

Have you ever sharpened a knife on a stone? It is a tedious but rewarding task. The way that I have seen is that you run the knife across the stone repeatedly on the first side until you get a burr or edge of material folding over on the second side. You then run side 2 across the stone until the burr is pushed from that side to side 1. You then change to a less course stone and repeat this process. The point is that a person needs to be intentional and patient to do this well. It cannot be done haphazardly. If it is done haphazardly then you will not sharpen your blade, just dull the edge.

We are also familiar with the fact that we are formed by what we take in. The old phrase, "you are what you eat," is true for food, but also true for our minds too. St. Thomas Aquinas spoke that curiosity is a vice with the opposing virtue being studiousness. This seems backwards to our world that praises curiosity, but it often plays out in our world as a vice. Studiousness for St. Thomas was intentional, disciplined study into subjects that would further our minds. Curiosity on the other hand is this superficial jumping from one topic to the next without ever going very deep. A great example of this curiosity in our world is watching reels or these short videos on all topics. It does not even have to be bad material, but we scroll from one to the next and in the end we feel drained. Whereas if we were to be studious, we could intentionally seek those things which will fill us. We could read a good book, watch a video on formed, and grow in our knowledge of some helpful topic.

If we tie these two images together, intentional study is seeking to sharpen the knife; curiosity unchecked dulls it. When we think about competing well for the faith, do we ever think about what we are feeding ourselves as part of our preparation? I know that many of us think about what we take in through our mouths. Do we reflect upon what we take in through our eyes? If we wish to compete well for the faith, then we need discipline (I speak as one who needs to be reminded of this just as much as everyone else).

Athletes train in all aspects of their life for awards that tarnish and collect dust, but we train for eternal glory. Do we seek to hone ourselves by the material that we take in or do we allow ourselves to be dulled by the haphazard strokes we make by the curious, shallow jumping from one topic to the next?
