Dear Padre,

I want my son to be confirmed this year, but he won't go to confirmation classes or select a sponsor. What should I do?

Then your son was baptized, you promised to raise him in the faith. Going to Mass and making faith part of your home life has been part of his upbringing, but forcing him to be confirmed can result in resentment and drive him further from you and his Catholic faith. Try these three things:

First, have a heartfelt and personal discussion (or several) with him, sharing what your Catholic faith means to you.

Second, speak with the confirmation teacher or DRE. He or she has dealt with this before and can work with you both to understand his refusal.

Third, engage him in discovering God at work in his life through the people



and movements he's attracted to. Young people are often idealistic and can become disenchanted with the Church and other authority figures. The sooner they know you're willing to let them examine and understand what being Catholic means, the less inclined they will be to reject the Church.

What he needs is the steady, meaningful message that he is loved and important to you, God,

and the Church, Trust that God's will comes to fruition, Confirmation should occur when a person manifests a true desire and has undergone necessary preparation. These suggestions aren't easy but reflect the faith you want to pass on.

Accept the gift of Advent

Advent is a beautiful liturgical season we can use to prepare our hearts to welcome Christ when he comes again. This mystical time helps us to reconnect with God and his Church. It's sometimes called "Little Lent," because the Church considers it a season during which we refocus our lives using prayer, penance and almsgiving.

PREPARE

Try these suggestions to prepare for, reconnect with, and center on the expected Savior during Advent.

Start with Reconciliation

Many parishes host Advent

Penance Services. If you can, attend one to share God's mercy with friends and neighbors. Otherwise, be sure to make time for Confession before

Christmas so you can greet the newborn Savior with the joy of a clean heart.

Light a wreath

A simple way to mark the season, Advent wreaths are a time-honored tradition rich in symbolism. The circular shape of the wreath reminds us that God is eternal; he has no beginning and no end. The wreath itself is often made of evergreens, symbolizing everlasting life. Each week, an additional candle is lit, accompanied by Scripture-based meditations and prayers. The progressive lighting of the candles in the Advent

wreath models the expectation of Christ's coming.

The four candles (three violet, one rose) symbolize the four thousand years between the fall of Adam and Eve and Christ's birth. The rose candle, representing joy, is lit on the third Sunday of Advent (called Gaudete Sunday) to mark the halfway point of the season.

Begin a Nativity Scene

A Nativity Scene is a visual reminder that "the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us" (John 1:14). Also known as a crèche, we think the custom

of displaying the Nativity Scene began with St. Francis of Assisi as a way to illustrate the humility of Jesus' birth. To imitate his lesson, set out an empty stable and manger on the first Sunday of Advent. Each week, add figures: livestock, Mary, Joseph, shepherds and angels. On Christmas morning, place the Baby in the manger.

Pray the wait

Advent teaches us to wait and anticipate Christ's coming. "They that hope in the LORD will renew their strength" (Isaiah 40:31).

Hoping and waiting well are closely connected. Because we know God keeps his promises, we don't wait anxiously for him, but instead look forward to the fulfillment of his promises with joy. Advent is the time to practice waiting with joyful hope. Any time you have to wait in line, in traffic, for an appointment, or even for someone to reply to a text, pray. Praying the wait is hope in action.

RECONNECT

Listen for God's voice

Scripture is God speaking to us. During Advent, try reading an entire Gospel—or two. Short on time? Read the Gospel of St. Mark—the shortest of the four Gospels. Or, read a few lines each night and meditate on them. Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal how God is speaking to you through what you read.

Turn to the saints

For extra inspiration, turn to the saints whose feast days occur during the season of Advent: St. Andrew (November 30), St. Nicholas (December 6), the Immaculate Conception (December 8), St. Juan Diego (December 9), Our Lady of Guadalupe

(December 12), and St. Lucy (December 13). Research established customs for these feasts or develop your own. (Don't forget, attendance at Mass is required for the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception.)

Advent reading


Challenge yourself to learn more about your faith and begin during Advent. Open your copy of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* (or find it online) to the Glossary and locate a word or phrase that is unfamiliar. Read about it until you can explain it to someone else. For more spiritual reading suggestions, ask your parish priest or go to www.growinginfaith.com.

Offer intentions

Each day, read or listen to the news and jot down the name of someone who particularly needs your prayers. Pray for her all day. The next day, add another person to your list and add him to your prayers. By the end of the four weeks, you should have quite a list of people for whom you are praying. Your prayers are powerful acts of love for people you may not even know.

Gifts for the Child

The Magi traveled a long way to greet the newborn King, making many sacrifices and suffering hardships to bring him gifts. During our Advent journey back to the heart of Christ, we can offer sacrifices and penance as gifts from our own hearts. Performing acts of service for friends or family, depriving ourselves of luxuries,



Reach out

The holidays are especially difficult for those who are alone or troubled. Include in your holiday gatherings those who might otherwise be alone. Or, consider volunteering at a nursing home, homeless shelter, or a pregnancy crisis center, for example. Look for Christ, who was also in need, in those you help.

CENTER

Travel light

Do you have a bad habit you would like to change? Would you like to stop using bad language? Gossiping? Viewing pornography? Feeling ungrateful? Advent is when we can become the people God intended us to be. Identify the first step you can take toward change and take it. The Holy Spirit will help.

Center around the Eucharist

"The Eucharist is 'the source and summit of the Christian life'" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #1324), because it is Christ himself—Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. In addition to weekly Mass, add extra Masses during the Advent season. Visit the Blessed Sacrament outside of Mass. Spend time with our Lord and talk to him as you would a beloved friend.

Pray the "O Antiphons"

Antiphons are the short Bible verses that come before and after a prayer in the Liturgy of the Hours. Specifically, the "O" Antiphons are the verses said during the evening prayers for December 17-23. Each names a title for Jesus: Wisdom, Lord of Israel, Root of Jesse, Key of David, Radiant Dawn, King of All Nations, and Emmanuel. The song, "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" is based on these antiphons.

Still the noise with sacred sounds

Drown out the secular music all around by creating your own playlist of music appropriate for Advent. Hymns such as, "O Come, O Come Emmanuel," "Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus," or "Creator of the Stars at Night," can top the list – or whatever sacred music puts you in a contemplative frame of mind.

Quiet and contemplate

It's easy to get caught up in the frenzy of activity that accompanies this time of year. Make time to find silence each day. Say "no" to unnecessary distractions so you can be open to God's will for the next year.





Why do Catholics celebrate Christ's birth on December 25th?

The Gospels do not identify a specific date for Jesus' birth. December 25 was chosen for several reasons, including that the date was close to the winter solstice.

The early Church attempted to replace existing pagan celebrations with Christian ones. Under



the Emperor Aurelian,
December 25 was celebrated
as the "birth of the
unconquered sun." As
Christianity became more
widely practiced, the pagan
celebration was replaced by
Christmas to celebrate
Christ's birth — the real
"unconquered" light of the
world.

'Tis the season to be jolly

Family dynamics can make holiday celebrations anything but jolly. Try these tips to make this your happiest holiday season:

Repeat, "It's not about me." Taking what others say or do personally makes you easy prey for someone trying for a reaction or looking for attention. Keep your power by choosing not to get offended.

Smile and nod. Arguing your point of view in heated discussions may feel momentarily satisfying but only serves to prolong tensions. Happy holidays come from smiling, nodding, and changing the subject.

Develop a bad memory. Reliving past hurts can make holidays miserable. Decide that this will be the year to forgive and forget.

Get up. Stand up. The more we focus on irritations, the more they irritate. When feeling irked, take a break to fill your water glass, stretch your legs, or engage in a different conversation.

Have compassion. You can wish your family experience were different but trying to change others is pointless. Instead use compassion to find new ways of love during holiday gatherings.



John 1:1-18, Who Is Jesus?

On December 25 we celebrate the birth of Jesus. Just who is Jesus and what does he mean to us? John explained that Jesus is God's Word born into flesh, the Second Person of the Trinity. He is the source of life. Jesus enlightens us about God and his nature. To know Jesus is to know God because grace and truth come from God, through

Christ to us. At the same time Jesus took on our human nature. He lived as we live, experienced what we experience, and suffered what we suffer. He knows

what it's like to be hungry and thirsty, to be tired, to be tempted. God, the Son, understands us

because he became like

Many who saw Jesus on Earth rejected him. They didn't recognize him as the Messiah. We each have to make a choice about Jesus. Do we choose Jesus as our Savior? Do we live our lives as if we are children of God? If our

answers are "yes," then Jesus is the one to whom we turn for truth and grace.

Q Is the Immaculate Conception about Mary or Jesus?

The Immaculate Conception celebrates Mary's conception without Original Sin. It refers to our belief that Mary was

preserved from the stain of Original Sin at the moment of her conception in view of her role as Jesus' mother (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #491). On December 8,

1854, Pope Pius IX declared this truth infallibly.

Because she was not tainted by Original Sin, she could be completely filled with grace. In fact, at the Annunciation, the angel Gabriel calls her, "full of grace," (Luke 1:28). This grace enabled Mary to say "Yes" to the angel's invitation, and to continue saying "Yes" when faced with hardship and suffering, including standing at the foot of the Cross on Good Friday.

God did not preserve Mary from Original Sin simply because he favored her, but because she had been chosen from all eternity to be the mother of his Son. Her role as Jesus' mother was crucial to his mission of salvation. Her grace-filled "Yes" opened the way to Jesus' "Yes" on the Cross.

Feasts e Celebration

Dec. 5 - St. Sabas (532). St. Sabas was born in (now) Turkey, and fled to a monastery to escape an abusive home. He became a hermit and moved to the desert. He attracted many followers, and formed a community. Though unwilling, he was ordained and eventually was named the superior of all hermits in Jerusalem. He died at the age of 93.

Dec. 12 - Our Lady of Guadalupe (1531). The Blessed Mother appeared to St. Juan Diego, a Native American, and asked him to have the bishop of Mexico

build a chapel for her. She sent him with roses to the bishop as a sign. When St. Juan emptied the roses from his cloak, it retained the image of the Blessed Mother.

Dec. 30 - The Holy Family (1st century). On the feast of the Holy Family, we celebrate the family life of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. By their love and support of one another, the Holy Family is a model for Christian families.
